Inspection of natural gas pipeline in your area

To Whom It May Concern:

SaskEnergy, and its subsidiary TransGas, take pride in providing safe and reliable service to our customers. Every year, as part of our enhanced safety and pipeline integrity program, we routinely perform a variety of safety tests and inspections throughout different areas of the province.

The steel natural gas pipeline leading to your property contains an anti-corrosion system called cathodic protection. Cathodic protection is applied to the below-ground portion of the pipeline and does not directly affect natural gas service. Testing of the cathodic protection system is completed every five years as part of our commitment to providing safe and reliable service, and in order to meet strict regulatory requirements.

To ensure the system is operating as expected, surveying and testing will be taking place from May to November by SaskEnergy or a qualified Field Representative who has been contracted to complete this work on our behalf. Field Representatives will carry identification indicating they work for or on behalf of SaskEnergy.

Frequently Asked Questions

Who conducts the pipeline inspection?

Depending on the area of the province, SaskEnergy, or a qualified Field Representative from CP Technical Services or CorrPro, will complete the inspection. With a target to inspect approximately 80,000 gas services per year, SaskEnergy hires qualified industry experts with a proven service record to ensure this important safety-related work can be completed within a reasonable timeframe. Field Representatives will carry identification clearly indicating they are conducting work on behalf of SaskEnergy.

In the unlikely event an issue is identified during the inspection, SaskEnergy will be notified by the Field Representative to send a qualified SaskEnergy Field Technician to resolve the issue and/or to complete any necessary work.

How often do pipeline inspections occur?

The inspection of our natural gas pipeline occurs on a rotating schedule every 4-5 years, on average. However, ongoing monitoring, maintenance work, and safety-related response occur year round.

I was not aware a pipeline inspection was taking place on or near my property. Did I receive notification?

SaskEnergy/TransGas conducts ongoing inspections of the natural gas transmission and distribution system throughout all areas of the province. We try our best to notify landowners and residents when inspections are taking place by contacting the local municipality or town office. With thousands of kilometres of land area to cover and weather conditions permitting, we are unable to provide the exact date of when the inspection will take place on or near your property.

We also understand that everyone's time is valuable. Our goal is to conduct the inspection quickly and with no impact or disruption to you.

Should I be concerned about my natural gas service?

Inspection of natural gas facilities is required to comply with Federal and Industry Regulations and is our commitment to providing you safe and reliable service. This is part of SaskEnergy's planned, preventative maintenance program. If additional work is required as a result of the inspection, a SaskEnergy Representative will be in contact with you.

I am not a SaskEnergy customer. Why do you need access to my property?

SaskEnergy owns underground infrastructure which delivers natural gas service to over 390,000 customers throughout the province. In some instances, there may be a utility easement or a pipeline on your property to deliver service to a neighbouring property. Identifying who is a SaskEnergy customer can be a challenge for a Field Representative. We continue to improve our processes and technology so we can try to alleviate this issue in the future.

Re: RCMP Policing Costs Charged to Municipalities with Detachments

During the Town of Lumsden 2017 budget deliberations the cost of policing was discussed. As you are aware, the RCMP Rural Policing Program assess the cost of policing to municipalities with populations under 5,000 on a two-tier per capita basis. This resulted from the SUMA/SARM Task Force on Policing and Administration approximately 20 years ago. This Task Force was set up to address funding equity of policing to all municipalities. Since this time, there is a different inequity happening.

Communities that have a detachment are incurring higher costs for the same service that other municipalities without detachments are receiving. The increase cost of having the RCMP detachment located within our community, compared to a community without a detachment is provided below for comparison.

In the last few years there has been a call for more policing in rural Saskatchewan which has put added pressure on municipalities. With the need for more policing comes the added cost and with the provinces requirement to make balanced choices, the Town of Lumsden is asking the two tier per capita model be discontinued.

From the 2017-18 Budget, and the messages prior to the Budget being tabled, the Province has provided the public fair warning on financial changes. Our community will immediately share in these challenges with the elimination of the grant in lieu of taxes and the increase in the PST.

Without considering the province's standard policing cost increase for municipalities in the current

budget, which will be approximately 8%, growth costs will be incurred. The new census information released, shows the Town of Lumsden has grown from 1,631 to 1,824 since the 2011 census. Based on last year's per capita rate the increase for the policing will be \$13,467.

With the recent events in the last year involving crime in rural Saskatchewan there has been additional focus for more policing service in our rural areas. All indications point to the Province trying to remedy this by locating more RCMP members. This will most certainly come at additional cost to municipalities that use this service. The Town of Lumsden is asking the Province to revisit equity in policing costs for municipalities and that these costs be shared equally regardless of detachment location.

Saskatchewan Environment Changes Scrap Tire Program

Saskatchewan Ministry of Environment has <u>announced</u> that it plans to develop new regulations for scrap tire recycling in the province. The regulations are slated to be enacted in June and will continue to use the Extended Producer Responsibility model. The creation of new regulations was a key recommendation of a recent

review of the scrap tire program conducted by an advisory committee struck by the Minister of Environment in November.

The current program, operated by the Saskatchewan Scrap Tire Corporation, will be wound down by the end of the year, at which point it is expected that a new organization/program will be in place to continue operations. The new program will not materially change the front end of the process, i.e., tire fees will be collected by retailers and remitted to the program, and scrap tires will continue to be picked up from retailers for recycling.

The new regulations are expected to clearly define the roles and responsibilities of each tire recycling participant. They will also define acceptable end uses for tire products and will support the Saskatchewan tire recycling industry.

A Message From Chinook School Division Trustees To All Residents of The Area We Share

Chinook Board members are joining with school divisions across the province, the Saskatchewan School Boards Association, (SSBA) and the Saskatchewan Teachers' Federation (STF) to encourage our communities to continue their support of publicly funded, locally governed education.

When the Perrins' Report suggested the option of one single provincial public school board reporting to the Minister of Education, our residents and indeed the whole of Saskatchewan joined in an overwhelming condemnation of the option. The provincial government, to their credit, backed away from that option and we all gave a sigh of relief.

Unfortunately, when the recent provincial budget for education was introduced, so was a proposal to replace the current Education Act with one that reflected the recommendation in the Perrins' Report. In the simplest terms, the existence of boards is retained, but virtually every decision is at the pleasure of the Minister of Education and the bureaucracy of the Ministry. Further, to add concern to the already troubling direction, the government has proposed that virtually all rules except the added authority for the Minister would be moved to <u>regulation</u> instead of <u>legislation</u>. There are some major implications for the proposed changes to Bill 63. To quote Dr. Shawn Davidson, President of the SSBA:

"Bill 63, in essence, moves away the responsibilities of boards from law, which must be changed during the day in a legislative process, into regulations, which are essentially rules that can be changed in the dark".

Not only can regulations be changed in the dark but they can be put into effect before the lights are turned on, without any advance warning or consultation. School boards would be left with almost no authority in legislation. If these changes are implemented as presented, they could also be imposed on any other democratically governed institution, including our towns, cities, villages and RMs. Virtually all of our public institutions could be impacted using the same logic or methodology. It's important to remember that these powers, methods and systems will be handed to this and future governments. How will they choose to use them?

To the credit of the Minister of Education and the provincial government, they have shown that they want to hear from the public on such matters. Reinstituting the funding of libraries shows they are concerned about the opinions, needs and wishes of their communities and constituents on whose behalf they govern.

All residents of the southwest are encouraged to share messages on social media, and to send a letter or email to their local MLAs and senior government officials with their concerns. The major points that we feel are worthy of concern to us all:

- The new Education Act (Bill 63) removes all legislated powers of locally elected boards, and transfers them to the Minister and the Ministry of Education.
- Using regulation instead of legislation allows change without public knowledge, consultation, or notice to our residents.
- This type of centralization of power could be applied to any other local government.
- These powers will be passed on to every government as they take office, to use as they see fit. This is not just a short term concern!

Keeping you informed

May 4, 2017

SUMA continues to **stand up on behalf of our members** in the wake of the 2017-18 provincial budget, to inform the public about the cuts hometowns are facing, and to ensure the provincial government is well aware of how these cuts are affecting our members.

Bill 64

Last we spoke about <u>Bill 64</u>, <u>An Act to amend The Power Corporation Act and The SaskEnergy Act</u>, we were updating you on <u>what the bill meant</u> to the 109 hometowns that are losing revenues and rights. We followed up that member communication with a <u>media release</u> and <u>event</u> on April 24.

The StarPhoenix <u>covered our perspective</u> particularly well. We also followed up to **counter some of the misinformation** circulating on what our members are losing. Our Executive Committee had an op-ed published in the Regina Leader-Post and the Saskatoon StarPhoenix to clarify some of the confusion the province, and more specifically, Minister of Government Relations Donna Harpauer, is sowing about this loss of revenue.

Some of the 109 members losing these payments from Crown corporations have started receiving letters from the Ministry of Government Relations with further details on how the cancellation of this revenue stream will affect their municipality. To help best represent our members, I ask you to consider sharing a copy of your letter with SUMA. By emailing a copy to suma@suma.org, you are sharing information that helps us advocate with the provincial government.

Bill 64 has received Second Reading in the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan, and will **soon be up for debate** in committee before it is returned to the assembly for Third Reading and Royal Assent. We continue to watch this bill closely, and will provide updates to members.

Moving Forward Means Meaningful Consultation

Over the last six weeks, SUMA has made it very clear that the provincial government's lack of consultation on major decisions affecting our hometowns simply does not work. Since the release of the provincial budget, SUMA has been pushing the government to **engage in meaningful consultation** with us and our members.

There are more than 440 SUMA members across the province, hometowns to nearly 80 per cent of Saskatchewan's population. These hometowns are vital to the future of Saskatchewan. We must be at the table to discuss the issues facing our cities, towns, villages, resort villages, and northern municipalities.

We expect consultation efforts soon on library funding. The \$4.8 million in cuts to libraries caught many people in the province off guard. After protests, social media posts, calls, emails and letters to the government about these cuts, the province reversed its decision, fully restoring the funding to all libraries for this budget year. In their release, the provincial government said they would be "engaging with libraries, municipalities and the public to develop a long-term strategy for the future of libraries."

We look forward to the opportunity to participate in meaningful consultation on library funding, and all other aspects of the provincial budget and operations that affect our members. SUMA and Saskatchewan's hometowns are important players in many issues, from the current revenue sharing formula and distribution, to alternative revenue sources for municipalities, from environmental issues to public safety and health. We will continue to promote, protect, and defend your interests as we continue strategic efforts to re-engage with the provincial government.

The company has exhausted all avenues to get some funding for the liquor store, as it has been foreseen by the directors as a very viable source of revenue and its last straw to save the Maple Creek Commercial Hotel. Unfortunately, all our applications for funding were declined. This has left the company no other option, as it no longer has the capacity to meet its obligations to creditors and investors, but to permanently cease its business operations effective April 28, 2017.

This letter is in follow up to decisions made in Saskatchewan's 2017-18 budget related to grants in lieu of taxes made by SaskPower and SaskEnergy.

In summary, the decisions announced in the budget were as follows:

- Beginning April 1, 2017, SaskPower will not be making a "payment in lieu of taxes" to 13 cities. The amount of this payment is not separately disclosed on a customer's SaskPower bill as it is embedded in SaskPower's rates. No towns or villages are affected by this decision;
- Beginning April 1, 2017, SaskEnergy will not be making a "municipal payment" to 15 cities and 94 towns. In the case of SaskEnergy, this charge for a payment in lieu is separately disclosed on a customer's bill as a "municipal payment"; and
- SaskPower collects a municipal surcharge on its customers' bills. It is separately
 disclosed on the bill under "surcharges and taxes". SaskPower is the collection
 agent only and does not retain any amounts collected. This payment is not affected
 by any 2017-18 budget decisions and will continue to be paid.

With respect to the discontinued payments, for the majority of municipalities affected, the reduction was equivalent to 15 per cent or less than the amount received through the municipal revenue sharing program.

However, for a few municipalities, the reduction was more than 30 per cent. After discussions with municipal leaders, government determined that for the 2017-18 fiscal year the reduction would be capped to ensure that no municipality will see a reduction equal to more than 30 per cent of their revenue sharing amount.

The 30 per cent cap will result in nine municipalities retaining a portion of their payments from SaskPower and SaskEnergy. They are Estevan, Humboldt, Melfort, Moose Jaw, North Battleford, Melville, Prince Albert, Weyburn and Yorkton. Specific arrangements for continuing the partial payments will be made in the coming weeks.

In the 2016-17 fiscal year your municipality received the following payments. In some cases these amounts are estimates given the timing of the payments, but are as close as we are able to determine to the actuals:

- SaskPower payment in lieu \$0 (has never been paid)
- SaskEnergy municipal payment \$61,192.00 Discontinued
- SaskPower municipal surcharge \$127,085.55 Continued in 2017-18

As noted above, these decisions are effective April 1, 2017 – that is, payments will have continued for the first three months of 2017. If your municipality is not affected by the 30 per cent cap decision, it would be reasonable for you to calculate 9/12ths of the discontinued amounts and use this figure for 2017.

There is no change to the municipal revenue sharing program for 2017-18. \$257.8 million will be provided to municipalities this year, a 103 per cent increase since 2007.

Government has committed to reviewing all of the grants and payments made to municipalities. Further information on this review will be provided as the process commences.



April 2017 Manager's Report

• April 2nd, 2017: As a past recipient of the Saskatchewan Economic Development Association's (SEDA) Economic Development Professional Award & also SEDA's Economic Development Initiative of the Year Award, SEDA requested that I serve on the adjudication panel for this year's SEDA Awards.

- April 3rd, 2017: Attended my final meeting of the Saskatchewan Heritage Foundation (SHF) Board of Directors. As the Heritage Property Act only allows an individual to serve a maximum of three two year terms on the SHF Board of Directors, I have maxed out at 6 years. It is anticipated that Cabinet will be approving an Order in Council sometime in the next month appointing a new SHF Chair and a new Board of Directors. Given that the Provincial Government has clawed back nearly half a million dollars from the SHF over the course of the last two years, the new SHF Chair & Board of Directors will have a difficult time addressing heritage conservation needs across the Province, particularly considering that the SHF was already desperately over subscribed prior to the funding cuts. In the 2017-2018 Provincial Budget the SHF's funding was reduced to \$300,000.00. This essentially cuts its granting capacity to less than half. However, despite the cuts, Maple Creek will again be receiving some project funding in 2017.
- April 4th, 2017: Attended the Destination Marketing Organizations (DMO) meeting with Tourism Saskatchewan. This is a twice annual meeting between the Chairs & Executive Directors of the Province's DMOs and Tourism Saskatchewan officials. At the meeting this year a presentation was given on the market segmentation work that Tourism Saskatchewan has been undertaking through a contract with Environics Analytics. They have broken Saskatchewan current visitors into five primary target market groups: Lakes & Locals. Minivans & Memories. Short Haul Suburbanites. Affluent Families. Long Haul Prospects. Environics has also provided Tourism Saskatchewan with consumer profiles for each audience, as well as information related to where within Saskatchewan's drawing areas these markets reside. This information is particularly useful in targeting marketing and in positioning messaging tailored to each consumer group.
- April 5th & 6th, 2017: Attended the 2017 Tourism Saskatchewan HOST conference. At the Saskatchewan Tourism Awards of Excellence Gala there were 8 finalists from within the Cypress Hills Destination Area. CHDA Inc. was a finalist for three awards (Marketing Excellence, Tourism Ambassador of the Year, and Tourism Employee of the Year), and there were three businesses from Maple Creek / Cypress Hills that were also finalists (The Resort at Cypress Hills, Grotto Gardens, & Cowtown Kids). In the end, Kristine Scheller, Manager of Finance & Administration for CHDA Inc., came away with Tourism Employee of the Year, and Cowtown Kids Toy & Candy came away with Rookie of the Year.

- April 6th, 2017: A cheque was received from Tourism Saskatchewan for \$19,500.00 which is part of the \$20,000.00 grant that we received from Tourism Saskatchewan for operating the Trans-Canada Visitor Centre. The remaining \$500.00 will be released by Tourism Saskatchewan once a follow-up report is submitted at the end of the season. The funding is being managed through a separate revenue and expense fund under P&D.
- April 7th, 2017: Prepared and distributed a press release related to Cowtown Kids Toy & Candy's having won Tourism Saskatchewan's Rookie of the Year Award at the 2017 Saskatchewan Tourism Awards of Excellence.
- April 7th, 2017: Received designs and prices from Pioneer CO-OP for replacement windows for the west façade of the Maple Creek Armoury. In keeping with the building's status as a Municipal Heritage Property, the windows replicate the dimensions and appearance of the 1914 originals.
- April 10th, 2017: Maple Creek CiB Steering Committee meeting. Please see the meeting minutes for more details.
- April 10th 13th, 2017: Interviewed 8 candidates for summer student positions at the Maple Creek Visitor Centre as well as the Trans-Canada Visitor Centre. The four successful candidates were: Cassie Bauer, Hailee Berreth, Corey Eirich & Shaylee Sommerfeld. Shaylee is a multi-media design student from the University of Lethbridge. We are hoping that she will be able to aid with graphic design work for the Visitor Centres as well as provide video production assistance to CHDA Inc.'s "Cypress-Wanderer" video program.
- April 11th, 2017: Served as the Master of Ceremonies for the CHDA Inc. Spring Forum and Chaired the CHDA Inc. AGM. There were 68 people registered for the event this year. The keynote speaker was the 2017 Saskatchewanderer Andrew Hiltz. CHDA Inc. reported visitation increases over the past year (at locations within the CHDA where attendance figure are recorded) ranging between 15.17% to 56%. Social media engagement increased on average by 38.79% across the various channels. DMF revenues increased by 14%, and membership increased from 43 to 55. The 2017 2018 Board of Directors were elected. The only change to the make up of the Board of Directors was that Marie Bohnet of Cypress Hills Vineyard & Winery stepped down, and her place on the Board was taken by Dana Hassett of Groto Gardens Country Market. That evening Larry Chiasson formally announced his plans to launch a tourism radio station in the Town of Maple Creek, and his hopes to see the station evolve to become a community radio station in the next few years. Also, the agreement between to Town of Maple Creek, the Ministry of Central Services and Tourism Saskatchewan to keep the Trans-Canada Visitor Centre open was formally announced. This was extremely well received.
- April 12th, 2017: Maple Creek MHAC / Maple Creek Main Street Program Committee meeting. See meeting minutes for more details.
- April 18th, 2017: Aided a developer in gathering information related to utilities and zoning on a property within the industrial area.
- April 19th, 2017: Aided an individual seeking information about acquiring property within the Town of Maple Creek as they are planning on relocating here this year.
- April 19th, 2017: Maple Creek Chamber of Commerce meeting.
- April 21st, 2017: Received notification from the National Trust for Canada that we were approved for one summer student position under the YCW grant program. They indicated that they were only able to fund 25% of the total applications that they received.

However, they anticipate that they will be receiving additional funding sometime in May. If they do, Maple Creek's application is at the top of the list to receive funding for additional students.

- April 22nd 30th, 2017: This period was identified for annual CiB Earth Week Spring Clean Up. However, due to the wet cold weather, the clean up week was extended to May 6th, 2017. To date seven groups have registered their public realm clean-up projects. The CiB clean-up week volunteer appreciation pizza party has been moved to May 6th, 2017.
- April 25th, 2017: Provided information to Doug Steele's office regarding the former hospital property.
- April 26th, 2017: Received notification that the Town of Maple Creek was not successful
 in our application to the CO-OP Community Spaces grant for the rehabilitation of the
 Imperial Oil brownfield.
- April 26th, 2017: Observed that the land option with SpanWest for the proposed condo developments will be expiring in the coming month. They still do not have the 10 expressions of interest that they need to see the project move forward. If these required commitments are not received in the next month, the project will either not move forward or an extension will need to be negotiated.
- April 27th, 2017: Met with a property owner interested in submitting an application to the downtown business incubation program.
- April 27th, 2017: Met with Councillor Morrow to discuss ideas for future marketing and promotions.
- April 27th, 2017: Received notification from Dr. Perrett that demolition to the interior of the former Maple Creek Royal Bank building would be starting, he believed, on April 28th, 2017.
- April 27th, 2017: Heritage Saskatchewan again recommended that the Town of Maple Creek be put forward as the Saskatchewan nomination for the Prince of Wales Prize for Municipal Heritage Leadership. I have attached a couple of the letters of support that were offered by both Heritage Saskatchewan and the Province as part of the nomination package.
- April 28th, 2017: Spoke at Tourism Swift Current's "49x110" conference about the Trans-Canada Visitor Centre project.
- This past month has seen a great deal of logistical work being undertaken with regard to the Trans-Canada Visitor Centre (such as garbage collection contracts, setting up phone service, sorting out internet connection, updating security monitoring and protocols, investigating point of sale systems, facilitating electrical & lighting upgrades, and plumbing repairs. Some preliminary information / highlights include:
 - The facility will be open seven days a week, 9:00am to 7:00pm, from Victoria Day to Labour Day.
 - The facility will focus on the promotion of the Town of Maple Creek and the CHDA through pop-up stores, brochure placements, video screen, and décor updates.
 - Special event days will be coordinated throughout the summer to showcase businesses and experiences available in Maple Creek / the CHDA.
 - Snacks and coffee sold at the facility will all be from local vendors as way of further promoting local business and experiences.

A BYLAW OF THE TOWN OF MAPLE CREEK TO AMEND BYLAW NO. 2015-MC-19 KNOWN AS THE COUNCIL PROCEDURES BYLAW

The Council of the Town of Maple Creek, in the Province of Saskatchewan, enacts to amend Bylaw No. 2015-MC-19:

Section 32.3 is hereby repealed and a replaced with the new Section 32.3:

The mayor shall have the same rights and be subject to the same restrictions as all other members to make a motion.

Memorandum of AGREEMENT

- between -

THE TOWN OF MAPLE CREEK (hereinafter called the Town)

and -

MINISTRY OF PARKS, CULTURAL AND SPORT - CYPRESS HILLS INTERPROVINCIAL PARK (hereinafter called PCS)

- The purpose of this Agreement is to assure structural fire protection for all building structures within the boundaries of Cypress Hills Interprovincial Park.
- 2) Responsibilities of the Town of Maple Creek will be to manage, certify, maintain, and operate the Park's structural fire truck (and related equipment) and to answer and action all calls for fire suppression on structures located within the boundaries of Cypress Hills Interprovincial Park.
- 3) PCS will be responsible to collect fees (levy) from all Park Lessees (cottage owners, business owners, and institutional camps) and remit said fees to the Town by May 31st of each year. The Town will not be responsible to collect unpaid fees directly from the Lessees. All Lessees within the park are named in Appendix "A".
- 4) The fee for fire suppression from private cottages will be set at \$40.00 per cottage. As of 2017, there are two hundred and three (203) cottages in the park. The annual fee will be \$8,120.00 from the cottages.
- 5) The fee for fire suppression from seasonal business Lessees will be set at \$80.00 per business. As of 2017, there are eight (9) seasonal business Lessees in the park. The annual fee will be \$720.00 from all seasonal business Lessees.
- 6) The fee for fire suppression from the one year-round business Lessee will be set at \$120.00 per year.
- 7) The fee for fire suppression from Institutional camp Lessees will be set at \$100.00 per camp. As of 2017, there are five (4) Institutional camp Lessees in the park. The annual fee will be \$400.00 from all the Institutional camp Lessees.
- 8) This Agreement will take effect on April 01, with the annual fee due May 31st of each year.
- 9) In addition to the annual fee, the owner of the structure involved with the Town's fire suppression will be responsible for paying a call-out charge of \$500.00 (\$300.00 to the RM of Maple Creek and \$200.00 to the Town) for the first two hours of suppression as well as \$250.00 (\$150.00 to the RM of Maple Creek and \$100.00 to the Town) per every hour after.
- 10) In the event of an individual's refusal to pay suppression costs, the Park will be responsible for collecting costs from the owner.
- 11) Once all fees are collected, 50% will go to the Town for the purpose of training, travel costs, certifications, and practices towards firefighters and the fire truck related to the Park. And 50% of fees collected will go towards maintaining and supplying all Park related structural fire suppression equipment. If maintenance or repair costs for the park fire truck exceed the annual allotment, they shall be paid by PCS.

- 12) The Town shall, by May 31st of each year of the term of this Agreement, provide proof satisfactory to PCS that the Town holds insurance to insure against liability to third parties which it may incur for damages to or destruction of property caused by the fire services provided pursuant to this Agreement.
- 13) The Town is responsible to maintain and service the fire truck and fire equipment. The Town shall maintain and clean equipment immediately after each fire call to ensure readiness for future use.
- 14) The Town agrees to allow one representative from Cypress Hills Interprovincial Park to sit on the firefighting board: that to be the Park Manager or designate.
- 15) In the event either party in this Agreement wishes out of this Agreement or any changes to this Agreement, the party initiating the action will notify the other party of their intentions ninety days (90) prior to the intended date by registered mail.
- 16) The fire chief or designate of the Town shall have the sole discretion to determine what assistance can be given and what firefighters and equipment can be available, and shall have the right to withdraw such assistance when and to the extend that in judgment, circumstances and his responsibilities require him to do so.
- 17) The fire chief or designate of the Town shall be in sole charge of the fire scene.
- 18) For the purpose of this Agreement, the period of assistance shall be deemed to commence after the initial call for assistance is received and shall end after the return of the fire fighting unit(s) directly there from. However, personnel wages shall continue to be charged out until all equipment is prepared for future response. May be based on the Town's fire department's policies.
- 19) PCS will be responsible to provide a heated storage facility for the fire truck including responsibility for the maintenance and utility charges for the term of the agreement.
- 20) This Agreement may not be assigned without written consent from PCS.
- 21) This Agreement shall ensure to the benefit of the parties and their respective successors and permitted assigns.
- 22) The Agreement shall be in effect from April 01, 2017 until March 31, 2018
